A LONELY MULE FINDS A HOME

The hoarding of animals - we've seen it on TV, and the cases seem to be happening with greater frequency. It is a serious mental illness whereby people "collect" animals until they have so many that the animals begin to suffer and die. The person cannot care for them properly, although they are usually delusional and think that everything is fine. It was just such a home that Sal the mule found herself in, skinny, neglected and starving.

In 2009 authorities were called to a farm in Virginia where 65 animals were living inside a feces and trash covered house, with 19 horses, donkeys and one mule outside, somehow surviving with no food, water or shelter. They removed all the animals from the farm and charged the owner with animal cruelty. The case went to court, the shelter won, but then the owner appealed, fighting to have all of his animals returned. Currently, they are still waiting for a judge's ruling on whether or not to rehear the case.

All of the dogs, horses, donkeys and miniature horses who had been rescued went into foster care at other sanctuaries, rescues and horse farms.

But nobody wanted Sal.

Blind in one eye and elderly, nervous and shy because of previous mistreatment, Sal lived alone in a small paddock at the shelter, waiting for someone to love her and take her in. For two years, she lived alone, unwanted and forlorn.

When we received a call from the shelter this Spring, and heard of Sal's story we knew we needed to give her the home that she so greatly deserved. With our two other friendly mules Hal and Gloria, we knew she would fit right in, so

we agreed to bring her to the sanctuary. Sal came to live at Poplar Spring in February of this year, and she has settled right in. She gets along well with the other horses and mules, loves running (and rolling!) in the large pastures, and seems to be truly happy now. Initially frightened by any movements to touch her, she has slowly learned to trust us and now enjoys being petted and brushed, and loves carrots and apple pieces. The shelter feels confident that the judge will ultimately rule in their favor, and as soon as the court case is settled we will legally adopt Sal. She will finally be safe and at peace, and we

finally be safe and at peace, and we will be relieved, knowing that she has finally found a home where she will be loved and taken care of for the rest of her life.

pring is finally here! We are so happy that this past winter was much less snowy than the previous one. Though we had some very cold and windy days and nights, the animals all did well, staying safe and warm in their barns, and they are now enjoying the new green grass and milder temperatures (and so are we!).

The very windy weather this past year caused us to lose several trees and tons of shingles from our pig barn roof. After many years of patching and re-patching the roof, this Spring we finally raised enough money to replace it with a metal roof to match the other barns. The goat and sheep barn roof is also being replaced, and the animals will soon have nice, dry, non-leaky barns to rest in. And speaking of barns, a huge thanks to Ahmed and Emile El

Ghandour for their extremely generous gift to build a new sheep barn. Work is beginning this spring on the new barn, and the sheep will finally have a beautiful and roomy space of their own, separate from the goats.

We took in many new animals this year, including three small chickens who were rescued when they were found abandoned in a park near Frederick, MD. There were originally six chickens

left to fend for themselves, but after only 24 hours predators had killed 3 out of the 6, and kind neighbor Linda Bisaccia rushed in to help. She and her husband managed to catch the three survivors, who were exhausted and hungry. The two tiny roosters, Sydney and Rufus, and one small hen, Roseabelle, are little bundles of personality, who now enjoy scratching and pecking safely

with their many chicken friends at the sanctuary. This winter little Carmen the pig, rescued from a farm where she was destined to go to slaughter (she was purchased by her caretaker, to save her from that fate) joined our other young pigs, Julio and Lita, to form a friendly young piglet group. The three youngest pigs in the herd, they all enjoy belly rubs and scratches, and romping and playing in their large pasture. Pigs are incredibly smart, and all three learned to sit like a dog when asked to. Their favorite treats are bananas and carrots, and they will "sit" very quickly if there is a treat involved!

Another big pig favorite is pumpkins – a big thanks to Becky Pugh, Tracy Kinol and families who collected over 120 pumpkins for the pigs after Halloween, and to the St. John Presbyterian Church who donated hundreds of pumpkins left over from their

Fall sale - the animals had quite a feast!

We again offered educational tours to thousands of visitors. Many groups and individuals volunteered, sponsored, and helped to care for the more than 200 animals that call the sanctuary home – thank you to all our volunteers, sponsors and supporters – we really could not do this without you! Several large projects and barn cleanings were completed with the help of groups PCRM and the Farm Animal MeetUp, along with our wonderful regular dedicated volunteers and fabulous staff.

Our special events over the last year went very well. (See back page and page 3 for dates and info on this year's events.) Our 7th annual Run for the Animals, held in May, was a great success. Over 600 peo-

ple participated in the 5K Run and one mile Fun Walk, which was held again in beautiful Wheaton

July we held our annual Farm Tour. Visitors to the farm enjoyed hav rides, refreshments and our giant yard sale. The 2010 Open House and Fundraiser was our most successful event to date, and raised an amazing \$77,000. for the rescued animals. Author Jonathan Balcombe was our keynote speaker, and spoke eloquently about his work on animal behavior. Our good friends at Café Green, Sticky Fingers, Honest

Tea, and many other local businesses contributed fabulous food and drink for the event, and we auctioned off over 300 generously donated items in our silent auction. In November, we had another record attendance for our Thanksgiving with the turkeys. The weather was much better this year, and we had an amazing attendance of over 800 people, thanks to a great Washington Post article

This year we also had a few extra fundraisers outside of the sanctuary, thanks to our wonderful friends and local businesses.
